B I O G R A P H Y (EARLY LIFE, EDUCATION & FAMILY)

Deacon Miebaka Kenneth Adoki's story began in the town of Okrika, where he was born on November 30, 1954. He spent his foundational years there receiving his early education and building the ambition that would drive his future.

That ambition soon carried him to the bustling city of Lagos, where he gained admission into the prestigious King's College. For Miebaka, King's College was more than a secondary school, it was the birthplace of a lifelong brotherhood. He remained fiercely loyal to the institution and his classmates for the rest of his life, eventually serving with deep passion as the Chairman of the King's College Old Boys Association (KCOBA) Abuja Branch. His fellow Kingsmen revered him as a true pillar of the association.

He continued his academic journey at the University of Lagos. However, his time in Lagos yielded something far greater than just academic and professional growth. It was in this city that his path crossed with a young woman from Anambra named Betty. She quickly became the love of his youth. They were married at the Lagos Marriage Registry, beginning a lifelong partnership that would anchor his family and define his legacy.

Together, Deacon Miebaka and Betty raised four children: Abiye, Sarah, Preye, and Tonye. As a father, his focus was forging their independence and building sharp business acumen. He actively brought them into his offices to intern and collaborate directly on projects. He also recognized early on where the world was heading and brought desktop PCs into the home, encouraging the kids to master tools like Corel Draw and typing software. He made sure to balance all that mental work with physical activity, keeping

the household anchored through games of chess, table tennis, and long morning walks. He also bonded deeply over Arsenal matches, a lifelong tradition he shared specifically with Tonye.

He was equally devoted to his siblings, nieces, and nephews. He served as a grounding anchor for the extended family, always showing up physically and emotionally. One of his proudest moments was walking his sister Sokus down the aisle.

Miebaka was spiritually grounded in the Lord, building his foundation within the Redeemed Christian Church of God & ensuring he entrenched this faith into the daily rhythm of his house. Following his early morning walks, he gathered the family for devotion where the children would lead the praise & worship sessions before he then delivered a calm, measured bible teaching to anchor their day.

Deacon Miebaka was an avid member of Olive Tree Parish in Lagos, where he turned his Awolowo road home into a church extension by hosting Wednesday house fellowships and the Eminent Citizens Fellowship. During this period, he was formally ordained as a Deacon at the Redemption Camp in August 2003. When he transitioned to Central Parish in Abuja, he served as Chairman of the Men's Fellowship, among other duties for many years. He later joined The Throne Room, where he focused deeply on being a voice of wisdom and guidance to the congregation. He consistently lived his faith through quiet, practical generosity. He readily shared his resources to uplift the church community, whether he was supporting a newlywed couple starting their lives or simply opening his doors to anyone in need.

FAITH, CAREER & LEGACY

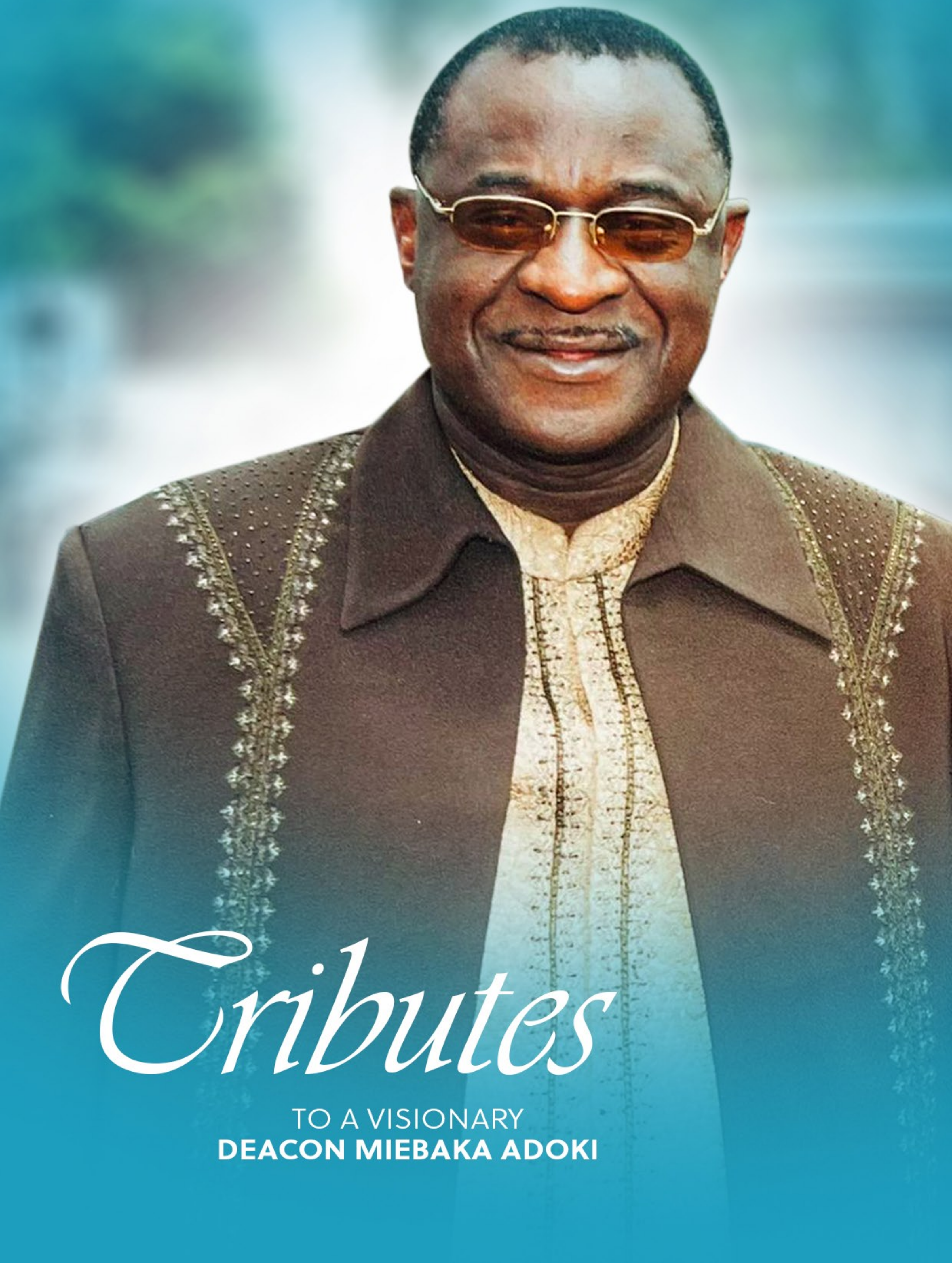

His technical footprint extended locally and internationally serving as the Managing Director and Africa representative of MyEvents International Africa, he also formed alliance with and was a member of the All India Council for Robotics & Automation (AICRA), The Information Technology Association of Nigeria (ITAN), The World Information Technology Services Alliance (WITSA) as well as in Nigeria where he was member, Nigeria Diaspora Affiliate Network (NiDAN), the prestigious Eminent Elders Forum (EEF), The Abuja Chamber of Commerce and Industry (ACCI), The National Association of Chambers of Commerce, Industry, Mines and Agriculture (NACCIMA) and many others.

Throughout his life, Mr. Kenneth Miebaka Adoki exemplified the spirit of a true visionary. He refused to be confined to a single industry, instead he was dynamic and always moved with the tide of innovation and change. His unique ability to look across borders, forging strong commercial and technological links between Africa and Asia, established him as a modern global citizen who always kept his roots firmly planted in the advancement of his home country.

Mr. Adoki's legacy lives on through his numerous impact in the corporate frameworks he pioneered, and the generations of professionals he inspired. He will be remembered not only for his brilliance and innovative ideas but as a man of profound integrity, whose lifetime of leadership left an indelible mark on everyone whom he came across in his lifetime.

A EULOGY FOR MIEBAKA Kenneth ADOKI

I had the privilege of reading Prof. Manny Aniebonam's tribute to Kenneth (Alaṣọ to me), my brother and friend from the Nigerians in Diaspora Alumni Network, NIDAN, and I'm on fours with every word of it.

Truly, Kenneth did not stand on the sidelines. He stepped forward, he served, and he built. When others hesitated, he acted. When uncertainty arose, he spoke with clarity and calm. Most admirably, you always knew where he stood. No obfuscation with Alaṣọ.

Within NIDAN, where we met in 2010, Kenneth was a pillar of strength and dependability. But his impact reached far beyond our organisation, into three areas critical to Nigeria's future.

First, he helped lay the foundations of the Nigeria Diaspora Investment Summit (NDIS), and continued to support it, even when he'd moved on to other projects. He saw early that the diaspora was more than an audience; it was a source of capital, skills and networks. He helped to give it structure, credibility and a real seat at the table of national development.

Second, he was passionate about sustainable mass housing. He believed development meant nothing if ordinary Nigerians couldn't live in decent, affordable homes. He pushed for practical, scalable, environmentally sound models and kept asking how we move from pilot projects to housing at scale.

Third, he championed an online tech business chamber for intra-African trade. He believed Africa's prosperity lay in connecting our entrepreneurs directly, using technology to make trade faster and fairer. His last years were spent laying the groundwork for that vision: an African Digital Chamber of Commerce.

And then there was Arsenal. Alaṣọ was a passionate Gooner who never let me forget it. As a Tottenham supporter, I got the full "noisy neighbour" treatment from him. Yet, it was all in good faith: banter, rivalry, and brotherhood. Sadly, he didn't live to see Arsenal's resurgence crowned with the Premier

League title, on the same night Tottenham survived relegation by the faintest of margins. He would have enjoyed that symmetry.

Beyond all this, Kenneth was a man of integrity. His word held weight. His sincerity earned trust. He was also a devoted Christian leader and family man who carried his responsibilities with pride and love.

We mourn his loss deeply. Yet we are grateful for the example he gave us: service without applause, loyalty without condition, work done with honour.

May God Almighty grant his soul eternal rest in peace and comfort his family and friends. In Jesus's name. Amen. –**Kachi Okezie, Esq**

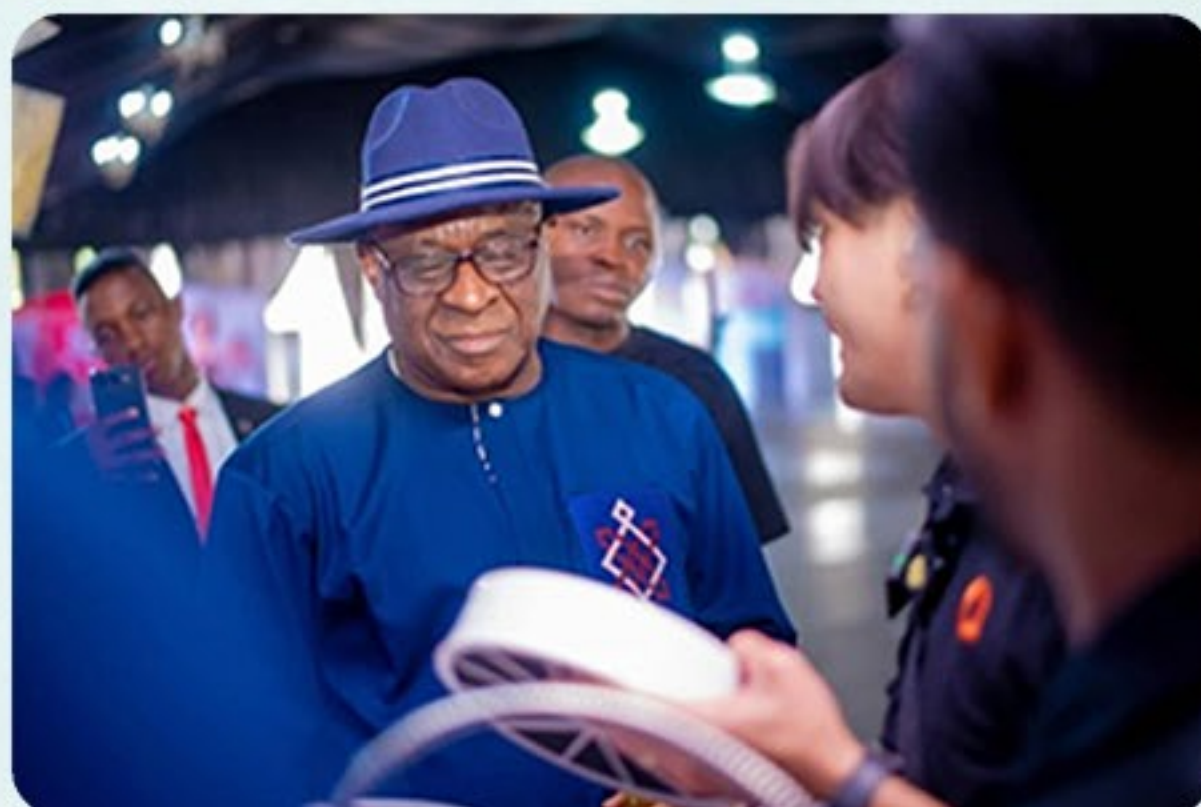

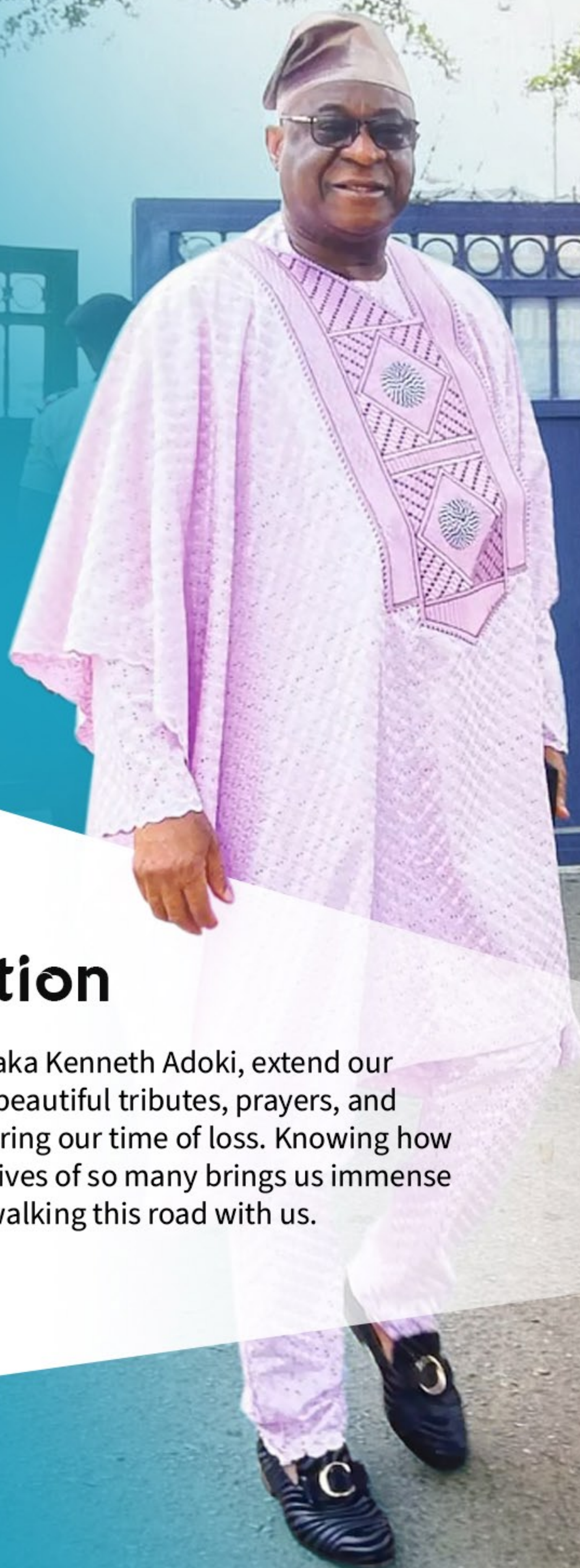
